School Talent Mighlight







Webs of Support Colour of the Month – Orange (Tangible Strings)

Last month we reviewed the color Red – The Rule of Five. The "Five" is based on research that has demonstrated that children need a personal village of at least five adult anchors in their lives. One of the things these anchors may use to build the web of support for the child are tangible supports or tangible strings. It doesn't matter whether we call them supports or strings, but when we do the activity in classes with students, we literally use string to make a web and use examples of tangibles to demonstrate the things adult anchors give to children to "web them up". Tangible strings are things like:

- Nutritious food
- Proper clothing
- Safe, warm housing
- Medical attention
- School Teams and Activities
- Things to do
- Volunteer Work/Helping Others
- Education
- A place for homework/help with school work
- Faith community meetings/services
- Transportation



These supports are easy to see and measure, and are provided by and through anchors. These tangible supports can come from adults in the family, school, faith community, programs, and agencies.

Ms. Deacon has been with us for the last 3 years as a member of the PE department and is a former student and staff member of Hilltop High School in Whitecourt. In keeping with her personality, Ms. Deacon is eager and enthusiastic to join the Wrap Around team to begin connecting and working with students by creating her own counselling role that best utilizes her unique set of strengths, qualities and abilities. Welcome to the Wrap Around Ms. Deacon. We know it will be an exciting, new adventure for you.



Among the many activities that the Wrap Around undertakes at the beginning of every new school year, our Gr. 12 Interviews are one of the highlights on our Counselling calendar. Wrap Around staff will meet with every Gr. 12 students starting on Sept. 25 to go through their Alberta Education transcript, review their Grad status, discuss their plans for post-graduation, talk about applying for post-secondary, scholarships and student loans and any other topics students may have questions about. After the interviews are done, the counsellors will call home to see if the students' parents or guardians have any questions or require further information. If students miss their appointment or are unable to attend, they can simply see one of the counsellors to reschedule another time.

The Wrap Around staff would like to ask any of our students who may be interested in doing some tutoring to come down to the Wrap Around and get an application form. We get many requests during the year, from both our school and the elementary school, for students to work as tutors for students who are having difficulty with their schoolwork. We act as the middle man between the tutor and the family. All the details regarding pay, hours and location are sorted out between the 2 parties and we simply connect the two. When students apply, they are asked to fill out an application form which includes having a teacher recommend the student as a tutor. Any student or parents that are interested are asked to come down to or contact the Wrap Around for more information. Two of the most highly regarded and valuable scholarships that are available to high school students in Canada are now accepting applications for their awards. The Loran Scholars Foundation and the Schulich Leaders Scholarships are open for application and interested Gr. 12 students are asked to inquire soon if they want to be considered for the awards. The Loran Scholarship has a deadline for application of October 11 and the Schulich Leader Scholarship is due at the end of January. Letter to parents - Resuming engagement on draft Social Studies curriculum

Dear Alberta parents and guardians:

Alberta's government heard clearly from Albertans that the province needs a strengthened approach for developing and engaging on curriculum, particularly Social Studies. I am pleased to share that we are returning to Albertans with an open, transparent and collaborative engagement process that reflects what we have heard.

Feedback received from Albertans and education partners during previous engagement on draft K-6 Social Studies curriculum indicated common areas for improvement, including volume of content and learning progression, developmental appropriateness, pluralism, diversity and inclusion, local and Alberta context, current events and First Nations, Métis and Inuit perspectives.

Using Albertans' valuable feedback, Alberta Education will be re-drafting the K-6 Social Studies curriculum to ensure content builds students' critical thinking and communication skills, enhances Indigenous and francophone perspectives and is age and developmentally appropriate. To inform the re-drafting process, the ministry is resuming engagement with Albertans, through a comprehensive and phased approach.

Phase one - Preliminary engagement

As part of the first engagement phase, we are gathering information about what Albertans, including parents, would like students to learn in Alberta's Social Studies curriculum through a survey and discussion guide on Alberta.ca.

We have provided a discussion guide that can be used as a tool to facilitate conversations within your community and to help you organize your feedback before completing the survey. The survey will remain open until **October 16**, **2023**, and I encourage you to share it within your networks.

Phase two – Targeted engagement

Starting this fall, Alberta Education will meet with diverse education partners, teachers, multicultural organizations, Indigenous and francophone communities and other education specialists to inform development of the scope and sequence of K-12 Social Studies curriculum and content of draft K-6 Social Studies curriculum.

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
